

#### OLD SOUTHWELLIAN SOCIETY

There are five presentations to be made today that are given by the Old Southwellian Society. We are very pleased that the School has allowed us to make these presentations on this particularly special day. The Old Southwellian Society prizes are usually presented at our annual dinner, which takes place on the Saturday immediately preceding Good Friday. Unfortunately the year 2001 dinner could not take place for a number of reasons.


