



A Who's Who List of Prize Benefactors Notes kindly submitted by Mr Steve Pulford

The Starkey Scholarship and Prizes: The award was made to the school by Sir John Starkey's father, Sir William Starkey, of Norwood Hall.

The Dudley Doy Prize - Award made in 1957: Dudley Doy was a Norfolk man from Fakenham. In the First World War, he was a pilot in the Royal Flying Corps and miraculously survived a horrendous air crash.

He came to teach Mathmatics at the Minster Grammar School around 1920 and for the first 25 years at Southwell he never had a failure in Mathematics examinations.

He was a great sportsman, playing cricket for Norfolk and Rugby for Notts, Lincs, Derby (The Three Counties) and was President of the Three Counties in 1947. He was appointed Deputy Head in 1930 and remained so until his death in 1957. He was Chairman of the Southwell Parish Council for a number of years, a fact which has been recognised by the Parish Council by naming a road after him off Halam Road. Dudley Doy was also Senior Church Warden at the Minster.

After his death, the Old Southwellian Society set up the 'Dudley Doy Prize' in his memory.

The John Roach and the Bertha M A Roach Scholarship - Awards made for the first time in 2006: Gary Roach attended the Minster Grammar School between 1942 and 1951.

He played Rugby for the 1^{st} XV and was a member of the 'seven' which won the Lincolnshire Schools 7-a-side in 1949. He was a member of the school Scout group First Southwell, both as a Scout and a senior Scout. He was a founder member of the school choir.

After graduating in Mathematics, he went as a Lecturer to the University of Vancouver. He returned to the UK to become a Senior Lecturer in Mathematics at Manchester University and has spent the last 15 years as Professor of Mathematics at Strathclyde University.

Prior to 2006, there was a 'Gary Roach Prize' for the boy/girl who obtained the highest marks in Further Maths at 'A' level. In 2006 Gary wished to set up two scholarships, one for a boy the John F Roach scholarship and one for a girl, the Bertha M A Roach scholarship, who obtained the highest mark in Further Maths at 'A' level, in memory of his parents.

The Canon Glaister Prizes - Award made in the 1920's: Canon Glaister was a Canon of the Minster and very interested in English and History.

The Wright Classical Shakespeare Prize - Award made in the 1920's: The Reverend Joseph Wright and his father were both Headmasters of the school between 1900 and 1919. They lived at Park House next to the Nottingham Road site and were the last clerics to be appointed to the Headship.

The Archdeacon Conybeare Prize - Award made in the 1920's: Archdeacon Conybeare was the Provost of Southwell from 1931 to 1945 and also the Archdeacon of Nottingham. He lived in the house at the end of Vicars Court "The Residence".

The Neville Metcalfe Prize - Award made in the 1930's: Neville Metcalfe was a Solicitor in Westgate, partnered by Mr Stenton. He was Clerk to the Governors of the school for many years. He was a Commissioner for Scouts in Nottinghamshire and was very interested in Music.

The Broadberry Prize - Award made in 1981: Bob Broadberry and his wife made this award in recognition for all the school had done for their two boys Roger and Dean. Roger was outstanding Physics student.

The Lady Robinson Prize - Award made in the 1930's: Lady Robinson lived at Kirklington Hall. She was a very keen farmer and had a herd of prize winning cattle which won prizes at the three agricultural shows, The Royal Show, The Great Yorkshire Show and the Bath & West Show.

The Summers' Bequest – Award made in the 1930's: Hugh Summers was an antiquarian who kept a shop in King Street. He was very knowledgeable on the Minster and gave lectures on it all over Nottinghamshire. He was a Lay Clerk in the Minster Choir, hence the award to an ex-chorister.

The Clay Dove Prize - Award made in the 1970's: The Clays were an influential family in the Newark area, see the gravestones in the South Transept and the ex Hercules Clay School in Newark. Bill Clay Dove and his wife were a fairly recent branch of the family and lived in Sutton in Ashfield. The award was made as a thank you for all the school had done for their son Mark who was at school from 1963-70. Mark went on to read History at University and became Head of History at The Kings School, Peterborough.

Bill and his wife were very active members of the Thoroton Society, a society which studied the history of Nottinghamshire.

The Charlotte Brock Prize - Award made in 1986: Mr and Mrs Brock, who lived on Fiskerton Road, had two daughters at school of whom Charlotte was the elder. Both girls were extremely good at Art as was their mother who was also a very gifted tapestry worker and has an example of her work in the Pilgrims' Chapel in the Minster, a work on the Canterbury Pilgrims presented to the Minster in recognition of the work of the Nottinghamshire Police Force.

The Hugh and Marian Heywood Prize - Award made in 1969: Hugh Heywood was Provost of Southwell from 1945 to 1969. He was Chairman of the Governors at the time of the construction of the Church Street site and it was he, with Mr Rushby Smith, Headmaster who discovered a loophole in the 1944 Butler Education Act which allowed Primary and Secondary school children to be taught on the same site, thus enabling the Junior Department to be set up in 1946.

The Bristow Prize - Award made in 1991: Bill and Carol Bristow had two boys at school, Paul and Mark, both very good Rugby players. This prize was set up after the boys had left in recognition of the education the boys had received.

The Andy Clarke Prize: Andy was a boarder at school from 1975-82. He was a good Rugby player and captained the $1^{\rm st}$ XV. The award was made in recognition of all the school had done for Andy. He was also a fine canoeist, taking this as his final expedition for the Duke of Edinburgh Award off the Cornish coast.

The Margaret Galloway Prizes - Award made in the 1950's: Margaret Galloway lived in Vicars Court and was closely connected with the Minster. She was a very keen supporter of Nottinghamshire cricket and other sports, hence the award made in the 1950s.

The Basil Rushby Smith Prizes - Award set up in 1972/73: Basil Rushby Smith first taught at the school as an Assistant Master from 1929 to 1932. He then taught at Hastings Grammar School and Coatham School, Redcar, before returning to Southwell as Headmaster in 1945. He retired from this post in 1971.

Whilst in the north, he was involved in theatrical work and when he came back to Southwell produced the school plays for some 25 years. The plays ranged from Shakespeare to Galsworthy's "Strife" and "A Man for All Seasons" to "Toad of Toad Hall" and "The Batsman's Bride".

These awards were set up as the result of donations after his retirement. He was also Head of Boarding. He and his wife lived at Sacrista Prebend.

The John Sides Prize - Award made in the 1940's: John was at the school as a boarder in the 1920/30s. He was also a chorister, hence his devotion to Music. Later in life he became a sidesman and member of the Carlton on Trent Church Choir.

The Dakin Prize - Award made in the 1980's: Bill and Mary Dakin had five sons at school, four of whom were choristers. Tragically the youngest, Andrew, was killed in a road accident whilst he was working in Germany. The South door of the Minster is a memorial to him.

The Dean's Prize and The David Leaning Prize- Awards set up in the 1990's and 2007: These were both set up by The Very Revd. David Leaning whilst he was Dean of the Minster.

The Peter Legge Memorial Prize: Peter Legge was a chorister and boarder in the 1930s. He went into journalism but died in the 1980s. His widow set up the prize in memory of her husband.

The Carby Prize - Award made in the 1980's: Mr Carby was the Managing Director of Carmalor Construction. Generations of students of the Minster School did their work experience with Taylor's Garage on Westgate, part of the Carmalor Group, and this prize was a mark of appreciation from the group.

The Michael Paris Prize – Award set up in the 1980's: There were two Paris boys at school at the time of the amalgamation. Andrew was Head Boy of the Minster School in 1976/77, having come through the Grammar School. Michael followed his sixth form career at the Minster School, having come through the Edward Cludd School. Very sadly, Michael died through illness at an early age.

His parents made two awards to the school on Michael's death. The first was a donation to build the "Michael Paris" block at the Nottingham Road site and the second was the Michael Paris Prize to be awarded annually.

The Eric Roberts Prize - Award made in 1980: Eric Roberts was a Canon of the Cathedral and Chairman of the Governors after Hugh Heywood. He was the Chairman of Governors who oversaw the amalgamation of the two schools in 1976. His devotion to the school was marked by the naming of The Eric Roberts building at Church Street.

The Alec Cobbin Prize - Award set up in the 1960's: Alec Cobbin was a boarder at the school at the same time as John Sides. He was an influential businessman in Nottingham.

Philip Wood Trophy - Award set up in the 1970's: Philip attended the Minster School. He was exceptional at Art. He was killed in a road accident at Oxton while still in his teens. His parents set up this award up after his death.

Hilary Quinn Trophy - Awarded in the 1980's: Hilary was appointed to the new Minster School in 1976 as a member of the English and Drama Department. As a Duke of Edinburgh Gold Award holder she, along with another member of staff in the Science Department, persuaded the school to set up a school Duke of Edinburgh Award group in 1978. During the first year, initially there were 88 members, currently there are over 300.

Henry Howard Trophy - Award made in 1975: Henry came to Southwell during the Second World War as the batman of an officer in the Essex Yeomanry who were based in Southwell. He married a Southwell girl and they settled in Southwell after the war. They had a son and daughter at the Minster School. Henry became Town Crier of Southwell, a post he retained well after retirement.

Elizabeth Nall Trophies - Awards made in the 1980's: Elizabeth lived in Hoveringham and for many years was Vice-Chairman of Governors. She was a very keen musician and was organist and choirmistress at Hoveringham Parish Church.

The Terence Gill Prize for Woodwind - Award made in 2004: Terry was Head of the Junior Department for many years until his retirement in 2004. He was Cubmaster of the 1st Southwell Pack (school group). A brilliant oboist who guided the recorder players at school and throughout Nottinghamshire, he was Vice-Principal of the East Notts Music School. Recently he has been President of the Old Southwellian Society.

The Wilson Cup for Music - Award made in the 1990's: David Wilson was Head of the East Notts Music School and is a very accomplished musician.

His two daughters were excellent musicians being members not only of the school orchestra, but of the County Schools' Orchestra.

The George Whitaker Prize: George Whitaker was Headmaster of the new Minster School from 1976 to 1983. He saw the school through amalgamation.

The Tom Scott Prize- Award set up in 2009: Tom Scott was a member of the Lions Association and a very active member of the community who organised a wide range of events. He also used to be the grounds man of the former boarding houses of the Minster School.

The Old Southwellian Award for Music: The Old Southwellian Award for Music was made possible by Alvin Stardust the pop star and Old Southwellian (1954-60) who donated a Trophy to the Society in 1985. He himself has presented it on two occasions at the Annual Dinner.

The Very Reverend Paul Butler Bishop of Southwell and Nottingham

Bishop Paul was Installed in The Minster on Saturday 27th February 2010 as Bishop of Southwell and Nottingham.

He was brought up in Chessington in Surrey, attended Kingston Grammar School and gained a BA in History and English at the University of Nottingham. After graduating in 1977 he stayed in Nottingham working for a while as a social work assistant.

He then began working for Universities and Colleges Christian Fellowship (UCCF), for two years when he travelled across the Midlands, the north of England and Northern Ireland supporting the organisation's work among students. It was during this time that he began to explore his calling to ordination and went on to train for the ministry at Wycliffe Hall, Oxford from 1980-83.

The Bishop served his curacy between 1983 and 1987 at All Saints with Holy Trinity in Wandsworth. He then moved to become Inner London Evangelist for the Scripture Union, where he helped churches of all denominations developing outreach work with children, young people and families. His work included time on a range of inner London estates and working with the Black majority churches.

He was appointed as deputy head of Mission at the Scripture Union in 1992 he was also an unpaid minister at East Ham St Paul, in the Diocese of Chelmsford. In 1994 he went back into parish work full time as Priest in Charge of Walthamstow, St Mary with St Stephen and of Walthamstowe St Luke; becoming Team Rector at Walthamstow in 1997 until 2004.

He served as Area Dean of Waltham Forest from 2000-2004.

Bishop Paul was consecrated as Bishop in June 2004. He served as Bishop of Southampton, Winchester Diocese, from 2004-2009.

Bishop Paul has strong Nottingham connections and traces his call to ordination back to his years in Nottingham, when he attended Christ Church, Chilwell.

The Bishop has always been passionate about being part of the world church, with a particular interest in and commitment to Rwanda and Uganda. He served on the Council of the Rwanda Mission/Mid Africa Ministry from 1988-99 and 2000-1. In 2001 he became a Trustee of Church Mission Society (CMS) and was appointed as an Honorary Canon of Byumba, Rwanda. He has been out to visit Rwanda, Uganda and Burundi almost every year since 1997; a connection which started from a friendship with a Ugandan at theological college. He was appointed Chairman of CMS in 2008.

Bishop Paul is actively involved in ministry to children and in 2005 the Archbishop of Canterbury invited him to become an 'advocate for children' on behalf of the Church of England's bishops.

Bishop Paul is an author; he has published a number of booklets and three books: 'Reaching Children' (1992), 'Reaching Families' (1995); 'Temptation and Testing' (2007) and is a contributor to 'Through the Eyes of a Child' (Church House 2009). He has a new book on Children's Ministry being published in January 2011.
